### Introduction

At Sherborne C of E Primary School we provide all children with homework to enable them to practise skills and consolidate learning that has already taken place in school. Sometimes the aim is to repeat something done in class as a practice exercise. At other times, the homework will ask children to apply their learning to a new context. At all times, however, children will not be given work to do at home that they have not learned in school unless it is a project which asks them to find out about something new. For example, to do their own project about the Romans.

There are several reasons why we set homework:

- It helps to inform parents about work going on in class;
- It can further stimulate enthusiasm for learning;
- Children can use the resources they have at home;
- It provides an opportunity for some one-to-one adult time;
- It can be a great source for gathering topic information to share with other children;
- It is a great opportunity to rehearse key skills;
- It helps to foster good habits of organisation and self-discipline in preparation for the demands of secondary school and the wider world, for example meeting deadlines and prioritising workload.

This is the usual schedule of homework. It may be altered at certain times of the year, for example school holidays and during religious festivals.

## Our Routines and Expectations

The work will always have been explained and discussed in class before being sent home; it may be a continuation of classwork, or a maths games already familiar to the child. It is our intention, and good practice, not to send work home that the child cannot already do i.e. parents are not expected to teach new skills.

We expect children to maintain the same standards for presentation of homework as we set in school i.e. to use their best handwriting and a sharp pencil or black pen.

One day's leeway will be given regarding the deadline for handing in work, up to a maximum of three lates per term. Unfinished or missing work will need to be completed during break times and lunchtimes. If a child does not complete their homework on more than three occasions, the class teacher will contact the child's parents.
